Robert Sackville-West, 7th Lord Sackville (2004), writer and journalist, published his book *Inheritance: the Story of Knole and the Sackvilles* in 2010. He will be telling us the story of a great house, describing its history and, according to the historian and journalist Lucy Worsley, of its 'peculiar family'. Indeed Vita Sackville-West found her ancestors fascinating but repellent: 'a rotten lot, and nearly all stark-raving mad'. The author himself suggests that Knole itself drove many of his ancestors to despair.

Actions on the Group Development Report

The recommendations made as a result of the four Group Organisers' meetings in the summer were:

- 1. Take a survey of current group membership.
- 2. Introduce a register of study group interests.
- 3. Hold Group Organisers' Coffee Mornings.
- 4. Reintroduce the Open Afternoon.
- 5. Write a Group Organisers' Handbook.
- 6. Encourage Subject Networks, to suit GOs.

Here is the progress so far, and some plans for the future:

- 1. We intend to start on this process this autumn.
- 2. David Jackson, Organiser of the *Europe Today* group, has agreed to start to compile a register of the interests of new members. We hope this may lead to the formation of groups in unusual subjects, and those that we don't already run.
- 3. The first Group Organisers' **Coffee Morning** was held on 5 September. We will repeat these in a more structured way, with a different topic for discussion at separate tables, led by the Group Development Team. Next date is **Thursday 2 February 2012** at 10.30am at The Bullfinch, Riverhead.
- 4. The Open Afternoon was held on Wednesday 28 September and, although the attendance was lower than it has been in the past, it produced some very pleasing results. See report below.

5. Time to Learn in Sevenoaks

6. Subject Networks - this development has not really taken place, but it is in hands of the GOs themselves. We would like to encourage cooperation between the groups, so that each GO knows what happens in parallel groups, where there are some spaces to which they can direct inquiries they receive, and that the groups share resources, visits, etc as they find convenient.

In addition:

We hope to hold a single **Consultation Meeting** every TWO years, and follow that with a lunch for all the Group Organisers who attend. Very many GOs said they found the process more interesting and valuable than coming to a purely social lunch. They appreciated having a chance to 'talk business' with their colleagues, as well as to renew acquaintance.
