The Computer Groups

The well-established Computer group meets monthly, at Otford Village Hall, normally at 2pm on the third Monday of each month (from October to May). The entrance is $\pounds 2$, and includes tea. There is usually a talk on a topic of interest, followed by a question-and-answer session. Talks are illustrated and projected onto the large screen. Members may also raise problems they themselves have with their computers.

In addition we have a new(ish) group which specialises in working with AppleMac computers, and their recent innovations. Below, the Group Organiser, Dave Simmons, describes how the group functions.

Computers for the future

Rapidly increasing broadband speeds will affect how we use computer technology in our daily lives. Existing technology will become cheaper making it accessible to most people.

Households will have single, reliable servers with large RAID storage, where all documents, banking, music and films will be stored and managed by Smart menu systems. Heating systems and all domestic appliances will be centrally controlled for ease of use and monitored for maximum efficiency. Smart meters will monitor usage. Other equipment will report failures. Wherever you are in the world, you will be able to access your home server.

Landline phones will become a thing of the past, replaced by Smart mobile phones with voice recognition software to enable hands-free use. It will be possible to control hearing aids, and spectacles will be able to display data as well as 3D film and TV.

Exciting developments in medicine and biomedical technology include cochlear and retinal implants, prosthetics with touch grip and balance. Phones can monitor blood pressure and other essential regular checks, which may be stored by the NHS and accessed by health professionals using cloud technology as it becomes more reliable.

Most excitingly, progress in decoding the natural brain codes will allow the brain to interface with even more complex systems.

What is the Next Apple Innovation?

Just in case you haven't recently visited the Apple Store in Bluewater or their brand new store in Bromley, Apple seem to be making fast and furious changes to their products lines to stay ahead of the competition. The latest iPad has been upgraded with the best screen quality available which they call Retina. In addition they have also launched the new small iPad called the Mini.

If you haven't tried one of these remarkable new totally portable entertainment systems maybe it's time for a trip to the Apple Store. Most U3A members of the Apple group have bought iPads even though their main computers are PCs. This gives you a portable device for access to the internet, spread sheets, word processing as well as being able to show your photos and it even has a built in reasonable camera. There is also Google Maps for finding your way, listening to iTunes for all your music, access to BBC iPlayer, Sky Go and Love Film or NetFlix films. No wonder Apple have sold 85 million iPads!

Apple's other launches include the 13-inch and 15inch Macbook Pro laptop computers with top quality retina screens and the new 21.5 and 27 inch iMacs that are just 5mm thick.

There are two very exciting rumours about revolutionary new Apple products including a new iPhone in the shape of a watch. Apple CEO Tim Cook in a recent interview said that he was 'intensely interested' in TV so it seems likely that Apple will be changing the concept of TV sometime soon.

The U3A Apple Group meet usually on the first Monday in the month at the Methodist church hall in Otford. In May we are hoping to have a presentation from Apple at Bluewater about the iPad. Most meetings have a few topics and then the meeting is an open discussion with any subject that a member wishes to discuss. The agenda for last month's meeting was:
