Science Group Monday 13 October Mary McKinley: The Bloodhound Supersonic Car (SSC) – Inspiring the Next Generation

The world land speed record is presently held by the Thrust SSC Team who achieved 763 mph in October 1997. The driver was Andy Green and the project director was Richard Noble. The same team is now building Bloodhound with the aim of achieving a speed of1,000mph. The technical challenge of this enterprise is enormous so that this can be regarded as an engineering adventure. The presenter is very proud to be an ambassador for Bloodhound and will be talking about the car, the history of the land speed record and the major work that is involved in getting young people excited by the project. Our donation to the SSC project, in lieu of speaker fee, will ensure Sevenoaks U3A's name is engraved on the car, so come along and hear what it is all about.

Monthly Meeting Wednesday 29 October

Community Centre, Bat & Ball Start at 2pm Richard Platt: **Smugglers in Kent**

In the early years of the 18th century, smuggling on the Kent coast was a small-time affair, played to rules that both the smugglers and preventives understood and adhered to. Later in the century, though, larger cargoes began to be brought in, and the increased scope for profit brought with it a totally different breed of smuggler.

The new entrepreneurs were not local men supplementing a meagre income from fishing and farming, but professional smugglers, such as members of the notorious *Hawkhurst gang*, based inland. The large out-of-town gangs were by mid-century gathering in groups of 150 and more, and carrying off their goods in long caravans of packhorses.

The talk by best-selling author, Richard Platt, will develop this narrative.

The Network of 27 Chairmen continues to meet three times a year, in March, July and November, and attendance is high. The main business is to support existing U3As, and help form new ones. To make better use of the time available, it has been decided to run a Seminar once a year on a special topic, Finances, Recruitment/ Membership, Running Study Groups etc.. Members other than Chairmen would attend these, perhaps 3 or 4 per U3A. Kent in World War I

The third Kent Study Day on aspects of WWI was held at Salomons on 8 September, with about 80 members attending, of whom almost one third came from Sevenoaks or Knole U3A. There were four excellent speakers, **Bob and Fern Ogley** on the War Poets, **William Tyler** on The Home Front, and **Alex Patterson** who is the curator of a current exhibition at Chatham Historic Dockyard, on the subject of *Valour*, *Loss and Sacrifice*. This continues until the end of November and contains many rare and remarkable photographs of marine warfare, often overshadowed by the land battles. Details on the Chatham Dockyard website.

The Way We Were

The actual launch date for Sevenoaks was on Wednesday 7 September 1994. Looking back we were surprisingly well prepared, with a well designed folded leaflet which served as both an application form and a resume of the Study Groups we were offering. The fact that 115 members joined on the day is proof of its effectiveness.

Groups and Group Leaders

In the event, five of the Study Groups ran. They were Local Studies Arthur and Maureen Russ, German Conversation Hannah Eady, Botanical Painting Gordon Darby (the only group which is still running with the same leader), History of the House Jean Stirk, Book Group Magda Sweetland. However, ALL of these group leaders are still members of the U3A, and the subjects are still running in Sevenoaks U3A, some with duplicates.

What is more, several of those members took on committee roles and made a contribution to Sevenoaks on several fronts. The first committee was chaired by Magda Sweetland, with Nigel Britten as Vice-Chairman (who has since taken on running German Conversation), Arthur Russ as Secretary while Jacquie Hewitson, later a Group Leader, was the first Groups Co-ordinator, and Jean Stirk was the fourth.

Continuity

One of the hallmarks of Sevenoaks, therefore, was the stability created by those founding members. Twenty years later a good many of us are still around, leading groups or doing some of the basic work that keeps a U3A ticking over. Of course, this was 1994, and the period of that first recession when so many professionals, aged 50 or under, were losing jobs and status: the U3A appeared at exactly the right time for us, and gave many early members a sense of purpose and enjoyment that was both mental and social, and continues today.

Changing demography

It is a very different retirement scene now. The pensionable age is, of course, much later. Able retirees (particularly men) stay unemployed for just a short time before they are lured back to the workplace, while women find they are caring for elderly relatives and/or their grandchildren. This means that fewer new members have the time or energy to commit to their local U3A. Recent set ups have a slightly different orientation, with a focus on social activity, or on topics that are lighter hearted, while those with an attendant visit are especially popular. Fun is a welcome word.

And what happens next?

The U3A as a national organisation is hitting its stride, with a new U3A setting up almost every week, and existing ones expanding to numbers not imagined twenty years ago. It was good to be in near the start of that great adventure!

Seminar on The Bayeux Tapestry

For the second year running, the three Sevenoaks and Knole U3A medieval history groups joined together to hold an open meeting with a guest speaker. Imogen Corrigan, who is well known to

U3A, gave a vivid and fascinating talk on the Bayeux Tapestry on 8 September.

With her usual blend of facts and



humour, Imogen interpreted the events illustrated on the 'tapestry' (in truth, an embroidery) introducing us to the key characters and the messages contained in the work. Imogen reminded us that, although embroidered by English needlewomen, the work was commissioned by the conquerors, with all that implies.

Imogen's military background came through when discussing the battle itself, with fascinating background insights into medieval warfare and the tactics of the English and Norman armies. Suggestions as to the original purpose of the tapestry, and the history of the tapestry since its creation were also discussed. A lively question and answer session followed the talk and conversation continued over tea.
