From plants to pills Trevor Jones

The lecture will demonstrate how nature's Pharmacy has provided not only a number of traditional medicines that were (and some still are) used to treat common ailments but also how a knowledge of ethnobiology has pointed the way for medicinal chemistry to provide new and improved medicines for a wide range of diseases. Examples include the development of modern analgesic drugs based on an understanding of the mechanism of action of opiates and aspirin; synthetic derivatives of natural products now used extensively in the treatment of various cancers; purified toxins from bacteria and fish that are of value in treating dystonia, overactive bladder and migraine; advances in the treatment and cure of malaria based on chemical derivatives from plant extracts.

Magda Sweetland

David Jackson

For ten years, David Jackson has been the Group Organiser of *Europe Today*, but he has also been a member of the administrative team, handling the ever expanding database. Here, he talks about his experience.

How did you come to join Sevenoaks U3A?

We moved to Sevenoaks in 1982 and, like a lot of members, discovered that ours was to be a family home in a dormitory town. At retirement, I found that my friends were at a distance. A friend of my wife's mentioned Tonbridge U3A so I joined that in 2003. SDC ran Power Walking in Lullingstone CP, and there I heard people talk about Sevenoaks U3A. One of them gave me the contact details and eventually I joined.

Which groups did you join?

I joined a couple of *Walking* groups, and a German group where the leader was a native German speaker which worked well. That's essential in my view. It is not easy to find a native speaker and enough members at the same level for a language group. And then I joined *Britain* within the European Union, run by Florence Summerskill. Europe was a major topic from the end of the 90s, for about 10 years, and specifically the area of enlargement. Florence ran two parallel groups but when she stood down, it was hard to find another leader, so Richard Bird and I stepped in to keep the subject running.

Has the approach to the subject changed in that time?

We changed the title and tried to extend the coverage. It was first of all *European Affairs* and then *Europe Today*. A Study Group may have to change its scope like that to keep the subject alive. We talk about European countries and their different cultures, as well as the political dimension. The group has moved between 5 to 14 members, and now stands at 9 enthusiasts, but it is good to recruit new blood each year to refresh the points of view. After ten years, I am glad to say a new member has taken over the running of the group, John Harris.

Tell us how members prepare for the discussions.

At the start, this was all paper based. For my first presentation, I read five text books and prepared a script from what I had learned! At the time it was difficult to find much information on the internet. Now of course it is easier, but you need to go deeper than Wikipedia and present the key facts you have learned and your conclusions. We have turned towards taking a single subject for the year,

and can examine that in depth. We have looked at Electoral systems, Medical provision and Education and each member chooses to talk about the country they are interested in. We cross-refer when we can. Each year, I have prepared a digest of facts to avoid repetition of data, and that pulls the facts together in a simple format.

Why do you think members are drawn to this subject?

This is a topic that is in line with true U3A principles of informal adult learning. It requires a good deal of personal research, and then constructing an argument at the end of it to put to your peers. This may be too demanding for recent retirees, who are older than we were at the start of their U3A career. Volunteering at this level may be more difficult now, and that reflects changes in society.

But it's a perennial subject, and many members are keen to extend their knowledge, and understanding of the psyche of European countries. The difference between north and south is a division that's never going to be bridged. We need that knowledge to grasp what is happening in Europe and how that affects us. In the political debate throughout this election, there has been almost no mention of international topics. Our knowledge of other countries is still low, and Europe is quite a distant concept except as a holiday destination. Our Group tries to correct this deficiency.

On the subject of holidays, you came on most of the European trips organised by John Dean on behalf of the Social Events team.

My wife is German, and our family holidays were spent travelling to see her family. That meant our knowledge of other countries was limited and although I travelled to the major cities on business, that was a quick through put, airport to hotel. So travelling around Europe in good company was a wonderful opportunity provided by Sevenoaks U3A, and those trips were brilliantly organised by John Dean. The test is that everyone on the trip was a good dinner companion.

You took over management of the database two or three years ago. That's a key role.

Derrick Shaw had done a first class job in coping with the large database, so that it could meet its ancillary functions. When I took it on, I tried to simplify the number of fields, and set it up so that all the requirements are more easily executed. Apart from checking subscriptions once a year, it is used for running off labels for our own monthly Newsletter, and also there are specific requirements from National Office for the mailing of *Third Age Matters*. When I handed it over to the next database manager, there were seven A4 pages of instructions!
