AGM papers will be included with the June Newsletter.



Diamonds Galore and So Much More by Joyce Allen

Report on the guided tour of Hatton Garden in March

The walk was led by Blue Badge Guides Kim Dewdney and Rex Osborn (married to each other) and the party split into two groups. Throughout the tour we learned **'So Much More'** about the history of this area from strawberries, herbs and guns to Dickens and diamonds. Just outside the City of London Walls the Bishop of Ely (a close friend of Richard, Duke of Gloucester) built his palace, with a sumptuous garden, the speciality being strawberries. Shakespeare mentions these strawberries in Richard III. After the Reformation Elizabeth I handed over the palace to one of her favourite courtiers, Sir Christopher Hatton for his home. Why one of the Queen's favourites? He was a good dancer! The garden remained magnificent. On the other side of the estate John Gerrard, a well-known botanist, grew herbs beneath the garden wall. This is reflected in the street names of Herbal Hill and Saffron Hill. Hiram Maxim, inventor and gun maker, lived in the area. We cannot forget Charles Dickens who lived in Furnival's Inn (now demolished) and replaced with a large gothic building for the Prudential Insurance Company in 1890. Built with two staircases and entrances, as the company was to employ ladies and did not wish for any fraternisation! As Dickens became more affluent he moved to nearby Doughty Street. Diamonds: yes, of course - on display in the windows of the numerous shops, many of which have their workshops unseen in the rear, and since the war years the International Diamond Market operates from a building in Hatton Garden.


Future Visits

Trip to Henry Moore's Studio

Science Group Monday 13 May

Professor Nick Donaldson: Treating Spinal Cord Injury by Biomedical Engineering methods

In the 20th century, clinicians learnt to keep those who had suffered spinal cord injury alive, but their paralysed condition was chronic because the cord was not capable of repairing itself. Using electrical stimulation, engineers aimed to develop systems to restore limb and central organ function, so-called Functional Electrical Stimulation. Professor Donaldson will describe the advances made in this area of biomedical engineering.
